#### FEAST DAYS IN JUNE

#### **June 4: Day of Pentecost**



Fifty days after the Resurrection, on the existing Jewish feast of Pentecost, while the disciples and many other followers of Jesus Christ were gathered together to pray, the Holy Spirit descended upon them in the form of "cloven tongues of fire," with the sound of a mighty rushing wind, and they began to speak in languages that they did not know. There were many visitors from the Jewish diaspora to Jerusalem at that time for the Jewish observance of the feast, and they were astonished to hear these untaught fisherman speaking praises to God in their alien tongues. This account is detailed in the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 2.

The number fifty, as in the fiftieth day after Pascha, stands for eternal and heavenly fulfillment, seven times seven, plus one.

#### **Feast of Pentecost**

The Orthodox Church sees Pentecost as the final fulfillment of the mission of Jesus Christ and the first beginning of the messianic age of the Kingdom of God, mystically present in his Church. It is traditionally called the beginning of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church.

Besides celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit, the feast also celebrates the full revelation of the divine Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Hymns of the Church, celebrate the sign of the final act of God's self-disclosure to the world of His creation.

To Orthodox Christians, the feast of Pentecost is not just a celebration of an event in history. It is also a celebration of their membership in the Church. They have lived Pentecost and received "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit" in the sacrament of chrismation.

Today Ukrainians also celebrate Zeleni Svyata (Green Holidays)



The Feast of Triytsya (Trinity Sunday) celebrates the Christian belief of Holy Spirit's descent on the apostles. In Ukrainian it is also known as Pyatydesyatnytsya and in English it is known as Whitsunday, or Pentecost.

It is an ancient pre-Christian fertility festival closely linked to the spring-to-summer transition, the cult of the dead and agricultural rites. In modern day Ukraine it is closely tied to and celebrated along with Pentecostal Sunday and Monday.

The insides and outsides of homes are decorated with grasses and greenery, fragrant plants and wildflowers, birch, linden and oak branches – symbols of vegetative power. First, the greenery must be taken to church and blessed by the priest. Grasses and greenery are believed to possess special powers that protect dwellings from evil and magic. Young girls and boys get together, weave wreaths, sing, dance and welcome the summer period.

#### June 5: All Saints



The first Sunday after the Feast of Holy Pentecost is observed by the Orthodox Church as the Sunday of All Saints. This day has been designated as a commemoration of all of the Saints, all the Righteous, the Prophets, Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, Shepherds, Teachers, and Holy Monastics, both men and women alike, known and unknown, who have been added to the choirs of the Saints and shall be added, from the time of Adam until the end of the world, who have been perfected in piety and have glorified God by their holy lives.



#### June 12: Apostles Fast begins; also called the Fast of Peter and Paul

Having rejoiced for fifty days following Pascha (Easter), the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Apostles began to prepare for their departure from Jerusalem to spread Christ's message. According to Sacred Tradition, as part of their preparation, they began a fast with prayer to ask God to strengthen their resolve and to be with them in their missionary undertakings. The Fast is thought to have been instituted out of thanksgiving to God for the witness of the apostles of Christ. With this Fast, believers express their thanks for the apostles' endurance of persecution during their mission.

#### Prayers for our loved ones

At the entrance of the church you may find pieces of paper that look like the ones shown. Fr. Vasyl Maskal provided these for us. One paper is labeled for "Health and Salvation" and the other is "For Repose of the Departed." These two lists are there for you to write the names of those you know, love, and care about.

Before the Divine Liturgy the priest will remember the names of the living and the dead that are provided. This is done at the north corner altar table as part of the Liturgy of Preparation. The priest will say aloud the names of the living and the dead and remove a portion of the Prosfera (liturgical loaves specially prepared for the day) and place the commemorations on the Diskos along with all the other Saints remembered. For these commemorations, we respectfully ask that only the names of living and departed Orthodox Christians be provided for the Liturgy of Preparation. The reason being, later in the Divine Liturgy the particles of bread that were part of the Preparation Liturgy are placed in the Chalice right after Holy Communion with the prayer, "Wash away, O Lord, the sins of all those remembered here ... "

Our Communion with our Lord, God and Saviour Jesus Christ is a holy mystery which we enter into through the

mysteries of Baptism, Confession, the Eucharist, Marriage and Christian Burial. We do not exclude, but we distinguish between baptised and non-baptised members of the Body of Christ; the church. We will gladly pray for non-orthodox people whose names are provided for commemoration during the Litanies of Fervent Supplication (for Health and for those who are sick) and for the Departed during the Divine Liturgy. If we just see a name on the sheet, we will automatically assume that these are names of Orthodox Christians. But, if you know they are not Orthodox Christians, please make a note of it on the paper, so we know what we are doing.

It may be helpful for our regular faithful who attend every Sunday to also make a note on the top or bottom corner if they want a list of names to be continued each Sunday. In this way your list will not be thrown out and we will continually pray for those names you provide until you give us notice that you want to stop the prayers for any given list or make changes. Hopefully this makes sense, and if there is any confusion, please do not hesitate to ask our priest, the deacon, or altar servers. May the Good Lord remember us all in His Kingdom! On June 9, the Ukrainian Museum of Canada, Alberta Branch is reopening with a new exhibition after two years of being closed. The exhibition will feature embroidery, weavings, woodwork, ceramics, religious items and artworks that link the past with the present. The displayed works will also illustrate traditional stylistic differences in different regions and their adaptation in modern times, showcasing changes in Ukrainian material culture through the eras. Some of the designs belong to the 18th and 19th centuries but still have connections with our time. Art and photographs of Ukrainian historical events provide context to the artifacts on display.
